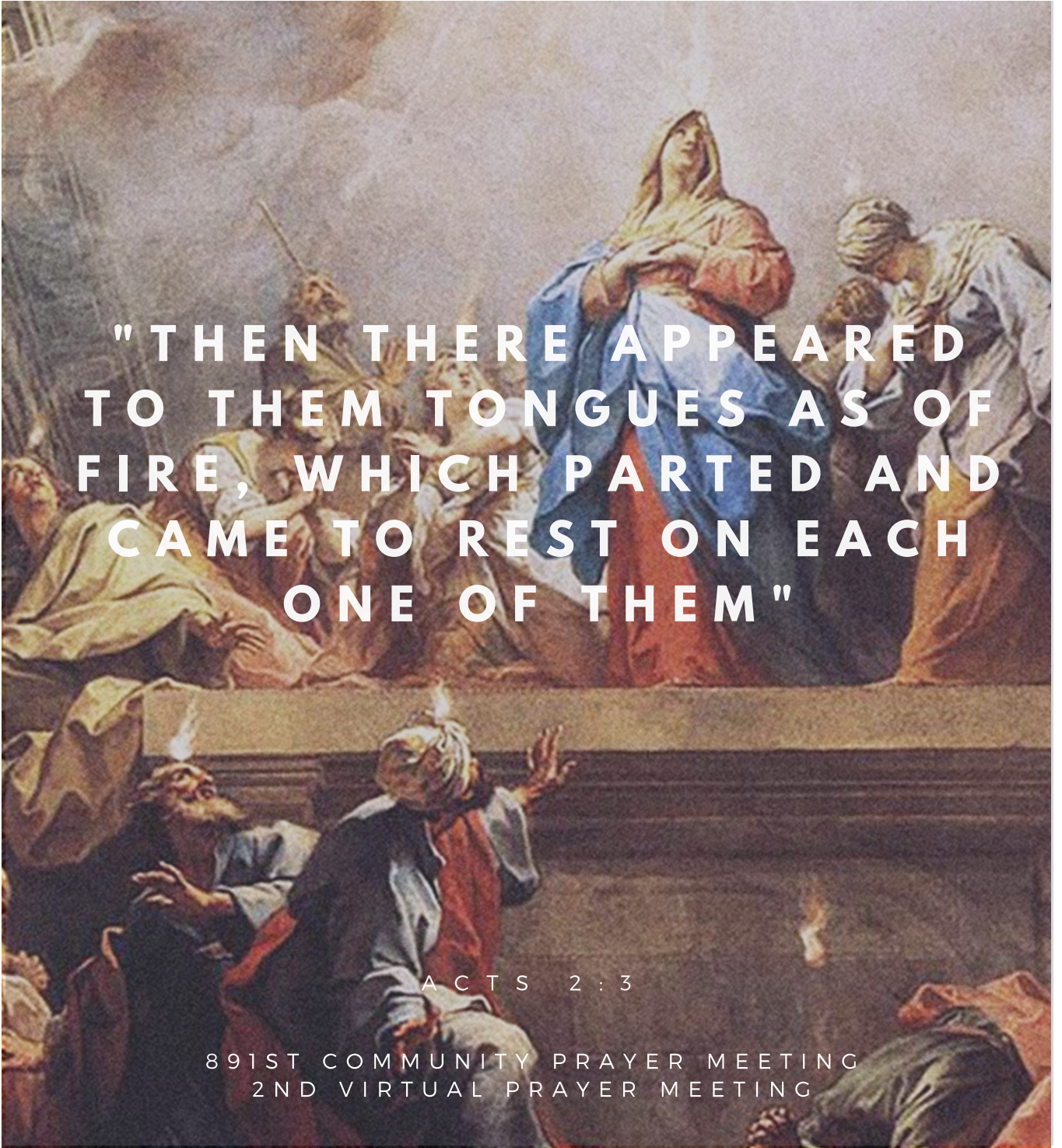

Waiting

Turn on the TV or listen to the radio and you will find a commercial touting the speed of the latest modern device. Entire industries have been built around speed. We have fast food restaurants, companies that can deliver your package overnight, we have movies on demand, and if you can't wait for Amazon to deliver your book tomorrow you can always download it. All of this because modern man does not like to wait.

But that is not how our heavenly Father created things. It takes weeks for a seed planted in the ground to yield fruit, nine months for a baby to be born, 365 days for the earth to orbit the sun, years of education to develop a skill or trade for your life's work, hundreds of years for a giant sequoia to mature, and forever for a watched pot to boil.

Why is it so difficult for us to wait? Waiting involves patience and perseverance on our part, and it often means not being in control of our life. For sure there are times when immediate action is required, but waiting can be a good thing and the right thing to do. It can give us time to think before making a rash judgement or acting in a regrettable way. But waiting in itself is not important, but rather what we do while we wait is important.

In Acts 1:4-5 we read, **"On one occasion, while he was eating with them, he gave them this command: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit."**

Our risen Lord knew well the weaknesses of his disciples. Therefore, he commanded them to wait for the gift of the Holy Spirit. In their waiting, their plans were put on hold, their trust in the Lord was tested, and as they prayed their hearts were made ready to receive the fullness of the Holy Spirit. From this waiting was born a new church which was completely reliant upon the Lord and infused with the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Through the power of the Holy Spirit their waiting turned into bold action as they witnessed to the Resurrection, proclaimed the Gospel, built community and drew many to a life in Christ.

Over the past 3 months, we too have had our plans put hold and our trust in the Lord tested. We have before us a unique opportunity. Instead of waiting for things to return to normal we have an opportunity to wait on the Lord and to prepare our hearts through prayer for a new Pentecost. I believe this is a time for our church to be born anew and we, like the first Christians, to be bold in living and proclaiming the gospel so that we may draw many to a life in Christ.

GIVE IT A SIDE GLANCE

A look at community life amidst a pandemic

I'm quite confident that most of us, not only in the People of Hope, but world wide, have become familiar with several new buzz words and phrases over the past few months. Do these sound familiar?:

Pandemic, "Keep well, stay safe!", 6 ft. social distancing, Covid-Zoom meetings, Hunker down-stay HOME!, No mask, no entrance, "Watching" Mass virtually, doctor visits, virtual school.

Like it or not, these expressions have settled into our everyday language, rising from a need to express new life circumstances since the coronavirus has invaded our world. Not just our language, but our jobs, our schooling, shopping, worshipping, recreating, traveling...you name it, and it has been impacted!

Now, how do we deal with these changes and challenges? Of course, that is a loaded question with answers on many levels. Personally, I have been able to take extra time for prayer, spiritual reading, and rosary time with the Blessed Mother. Serving others has been a joy and privilege during this trying time. In addition, something that has truly blessed me is a memory from our dear family friend of many years, Fr. James Carroll. In the early 70's I was an overwhelmed, young mother. I was seeking the Lord through spiritual direction with Fr. Carroll. A bit of sound advice given to me 50 years ago can be applied to our lives in this pandemic. Father said to me, **"Throughout hectic days, keep your eyes on your heavenly home, and give everything else a side glance."** In other words, don't be stressed over the everyday challenges of young family life. Just perform your duties in love as your eyes remain fixed on Jesus.

So, applying these words to this current state of affairs, my prayer life keeps me focusing on the heavenly reality that Jesus Christ is my Lord. The second part of that advice-the part about giving everything else a side glance, has admittedly challenged me. When I let my mind and heart wander from heavenly thoughts, it becomes difficult for me to give that "side glance of less-than-important" to many overwhelming aspects of this strange way of living. Praised be Jesus Christ, I don't have to fight this battle alone.

I have been blessed with a beautiful family that is loving and supporting me through these times. My broader, spiritual family, the People of Hope, has helped me keep my eyes on Jesus. The technological advancements that so many community members have generously and tirelessly worked on to keep us connected, have blessed my life greatly and have sharpened my spiritual focus. Here I name a few:

I love the virtual prayer meetings! When I'm feeling a sense of isolation from my sisters and brothers, I might re-listen to the praise and worship music, joining in with the singing. It lifts my heart. The display of the song's words in a large font, has been very helpful. I've been fed spiritually through the exhortations from Marty, Fr. John Gordon and others. If the quarantine continues, I pray these online messages continue. In addition, watching my brothers and sisters as they share their new and unique family favorite moments, many times spiced with humor, puts a smile on my face. At other times, receiving heartfelt witnesses from members has inspired and encouraged me.

A number of weeks ago, joining in with the Lord's Day prayers reminded me that I'm not alone on a Saturday evening. Knowing I can't be with my sisters and brothers in person, I'm joined with them in spirit, feeling closer to them.

Our women's group has not mastered a zoom meeting and not all of our sisters have computers. Therefore we are staying in touch through phone calls, emails, and writing notes of encouragement when possible. With the weather warming up, we had our very first outdoor social distancing women's group!

How I am enjoying our online community bulletins. What a blessing! Thank you to our tech savvy members whose knowledge, diligence and creativity have gifted us with a beautiful composition of love and information. The varied topics enclosed have given me inspiration for prayer, encouragement, and a reminder that I am a member of a body of people! I'm not alone. In addition to his own personal messages, I thank Marty for sending us links to various, inspirational articles from around the Sword of the Spirit and the Brotherhood of Hope.

Of course, as the saying goes, there's nothing like the real deal! We were not created to live a quarantined life, deprived of human touch. However, we have been given this challenge in our lifetime and Our Lord is still at the center of it. I am so grateful for the ways in which the People of Hope continues to assist me in keeping my eyes on Jesus and connecting me with members of our community. This enables me to give those other anxiety ridden challenges of the pandemic a **side glance**.

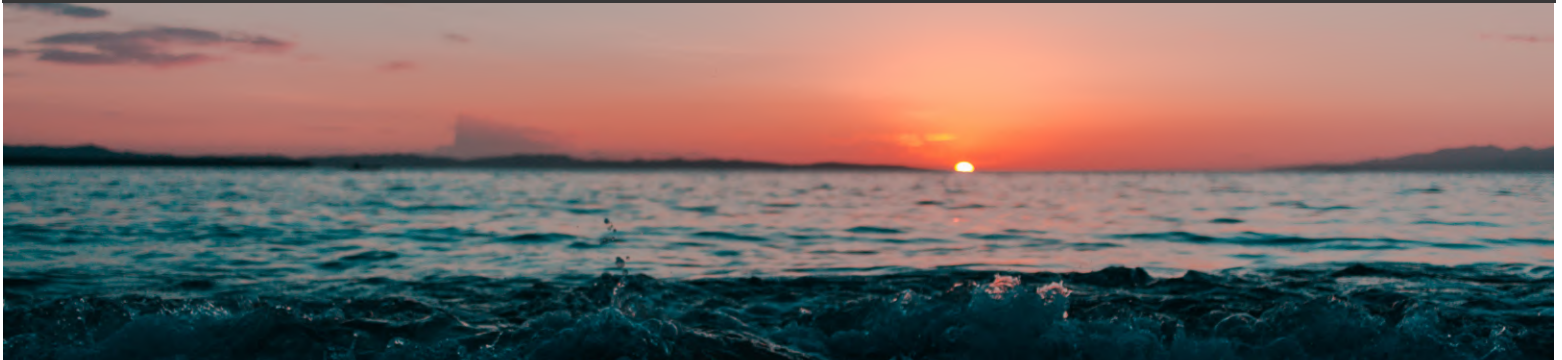

JESUS AT THE HEART OF THE VIRUS

AN ENCOURAGEMENT FROM A NURSE WORKING WITH COVID-19 PATIENTS

I am a hospice nurse at Morristown Medical Center, so in March when the pandemic was really starting to pick up I was asked if I would be willing to work on a covid unit, and I'm going to share a bit about this experience. This new unit was intended for patients who, for the most part, were not going to survive. My initial thought was to very quickly decline, but I soon felt the Lord leading me to accept this new challenge. So I said yes, during a time when great stress and anxiety was gripping everyone at the hospital as we all tried to wrap our heads around what would be our new norm.

Very quickly, nurses and doctors from all parts of Atlantic Health were thrown into these units with very little training, to help patients with a disease we knew very little about. Units were converted overnight to negative pressure rooms to try to protect the staff from this deadly disease and somehow, in the midst of it all, I felt a great peace in my heart about the decision.

Stepping onto our new unit with a group of staff members who mostly did not know each other would normally be a quite stressful experience, but every day as I worked on that floor I found myself feeling grateful for the amazing group of nurses we had, and the group only continued to amaze me each day after. We all really enjoyed getting to know each other and the great comradery that was built really made what we did a little bit easier.

One of the hardest parts of this experience was that these people who were dying did not get to have their families by their side. Staff did everything we could to ease our patients' suffering, but it only added to the stress. I found, however, that all the nurses truly cared about their patients and would often put their own health at risk to spend extra time in these rooms comforting and caring for their patients.

As a hospice nurse, I have seen many beautiful deaths where I know the Lord was present in these rooms. One patient I had in the last year was a man in his 50's with cancer; he did not have any family here and very few visitors. The priest came every day to see him and give him communion, and during his last day on this earth as I was spending time with him, I noticed that between tremendous pain and suffering, he would have moments where his face started beaming as he looked up. I know he was seeing the Lord right

there in that room! After his death I was speaking with the priest who visited him daily, and he told me that he asked this man how he was doing one day, to which he response was, "the nights get very lonely, but Jesus comes and sits with me." That phrase often came back to me when I felt sadness that our patients had to be alone, and I believe that the Lord would never leave these patients to suffer alone, but would stay at their bedsides holding their hands to glory.

I believe the Lord is working in many different areas of each of our lives through this trial, and we may never know all the good that has come from this tragedy. I ask you to continue to pray for all the healthcare workers, as I know many doctors and nurses have and will experience some form of post traumatic stress from the things they saw and experienced. Thank you for all the prayers, I know I have drawn great grace and strength from them. Stay well!

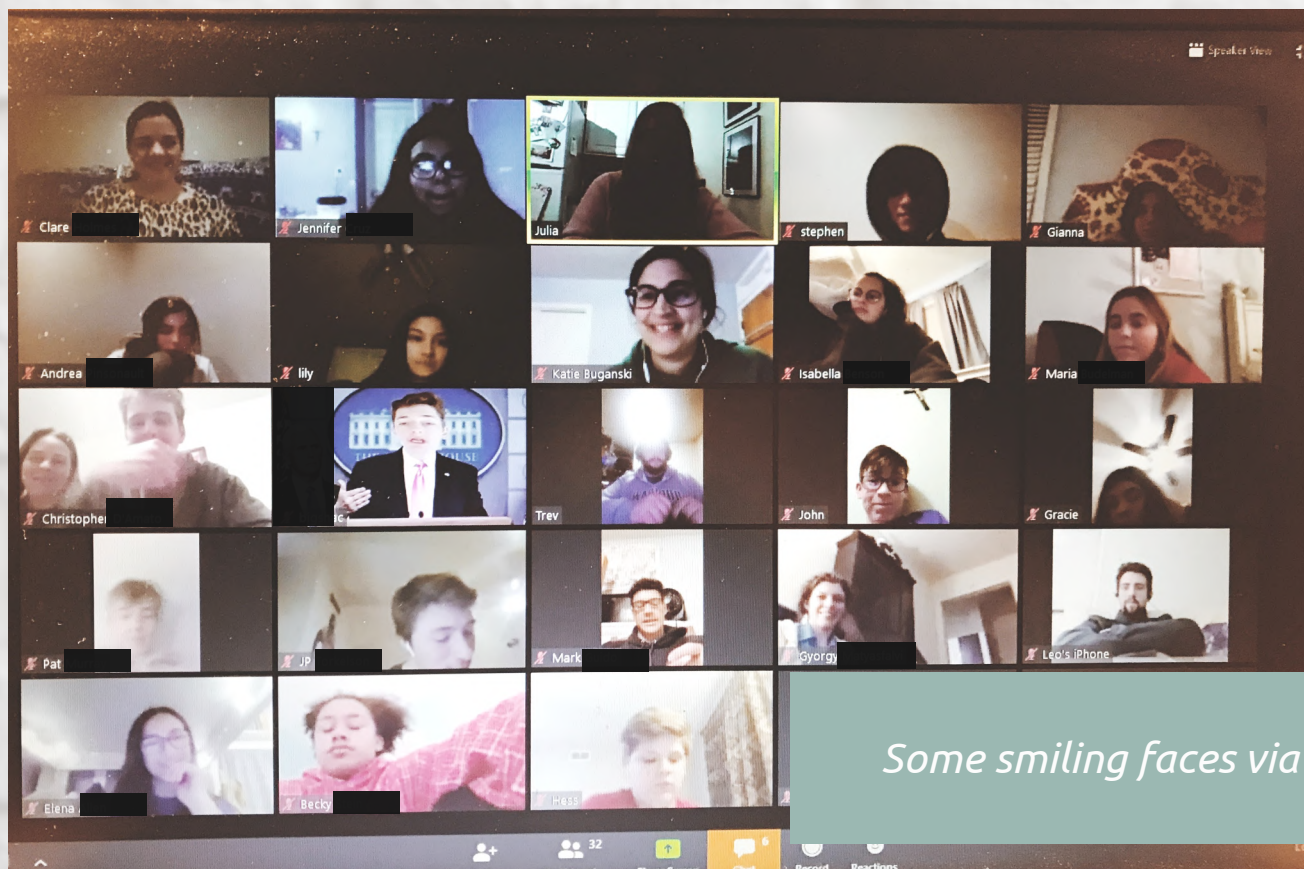
Can you briefly describe the event? How did technology play a role in this celebration?

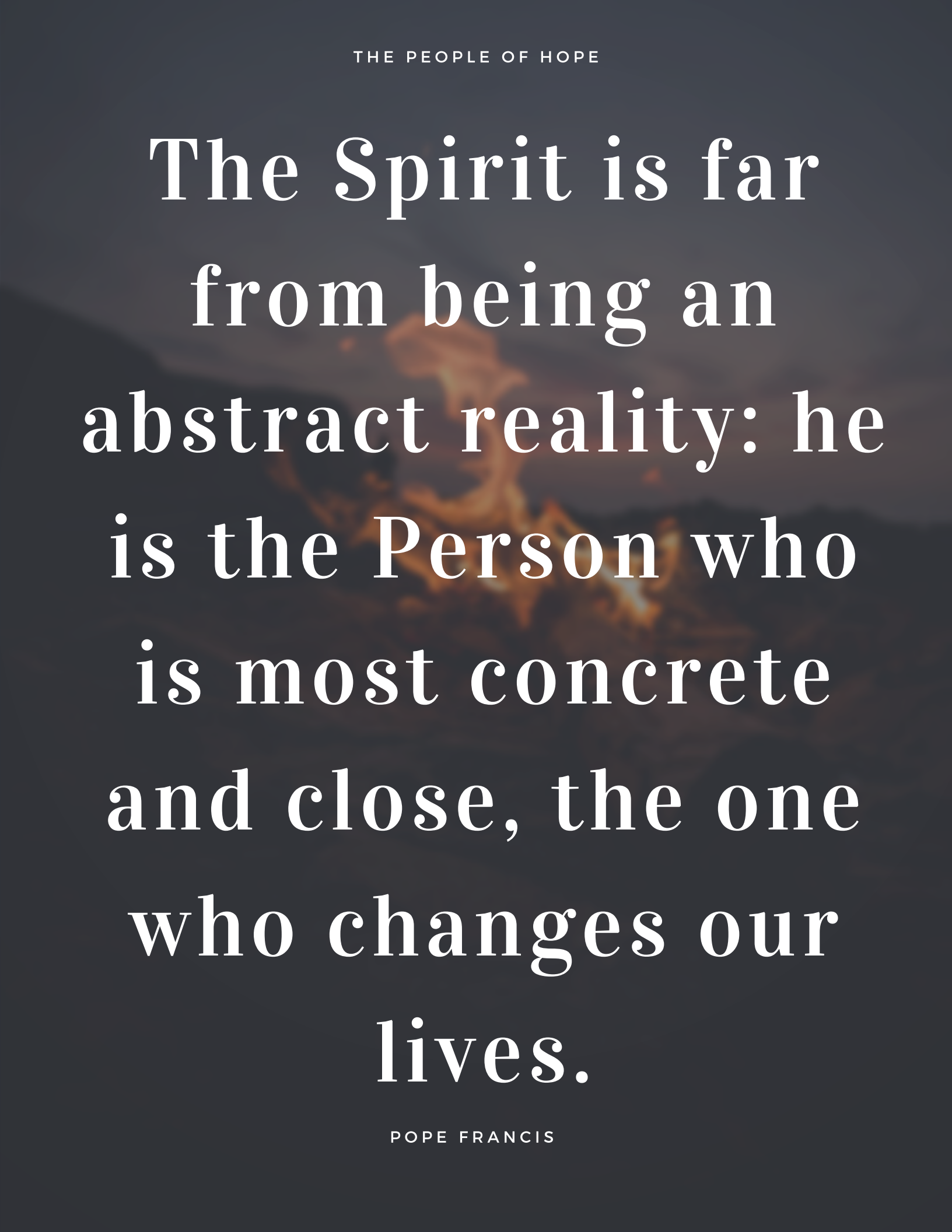

INTERVIEW WITH PETE
TOMASELLO

Q: WHAT DO YOU MISS MOST ABOUT PHYSICALLY ATTENDING MASS?

A: We miss receiving Jesus' body, blood, soul and divinity in the Eucharist. Also, every Sunday, we would attend the same mass as my parents and have brunch at their house afterwards. We really miss this family time.

Q: WHAT HAVE YOU BEEN DOING TO HELP MAINTAIN YOUR FAITH LIFE ON SUNDAYS? HAS THERE BEEN ANY TECHNOLOGY INVOLVED WITH THAT?

A: We use technology to attend our home parish (Little Flower) mass every Sunday. It is so nice to see a familiar setting and familiar faces. Besides the normal homily, our pastor, Father Andy, sends a video with a message every Sunday that warms our hearts. It usually contains "spiritual homework" for the upcoming week.

We've been hosting and attending regular virtual Lord's Days since the quarantine began. We start with the prayers, break for dinner, and come back on for fellowship and entertainment after dinner. It has been an amazing way to use technology to stay connected

WHAT HAS YOUR EXPERIENCE BEEN LIKE WITH PRAYING FOR IT?**

A: We feel that God has provided the grace that has been needed for every moment and every challenge. 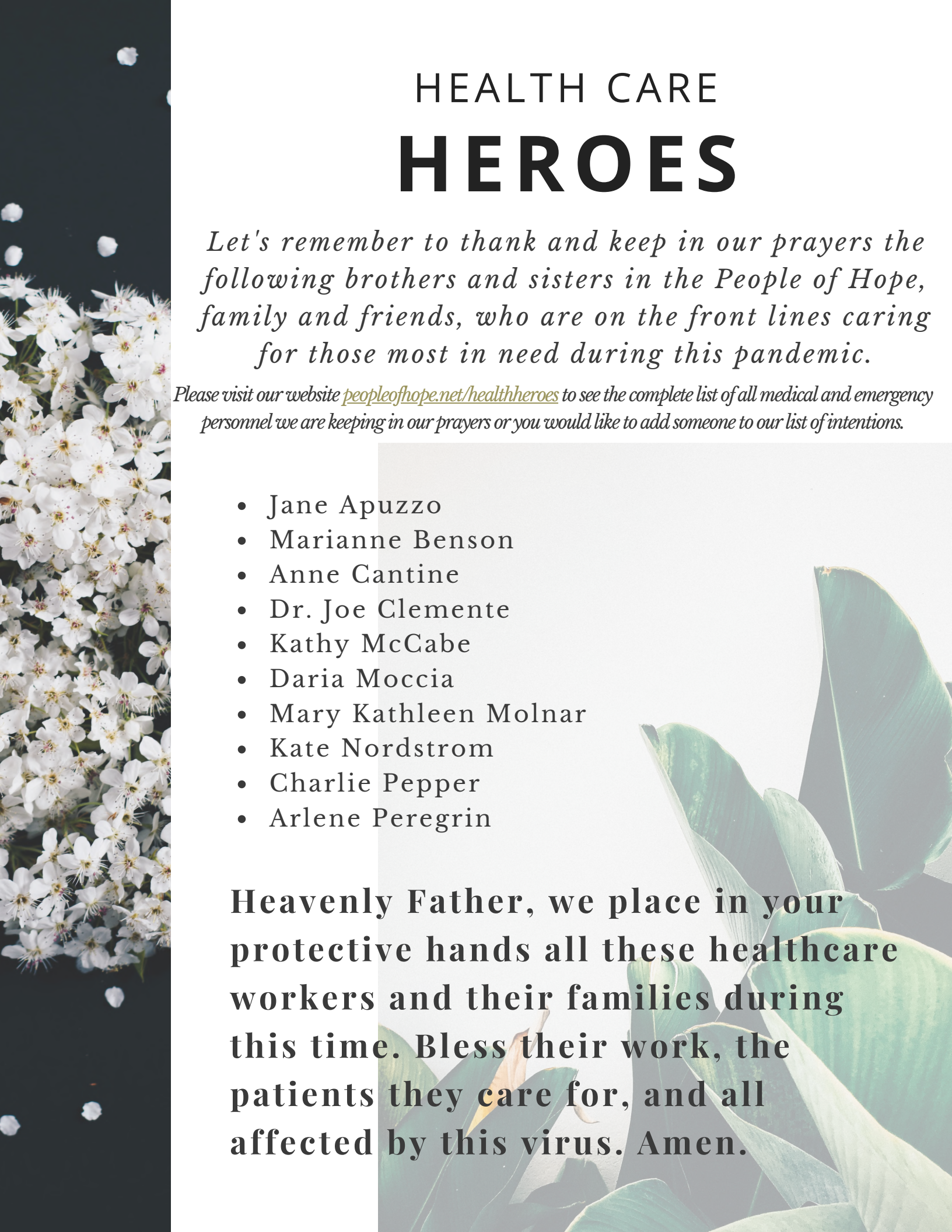

FAMILY LIFE:

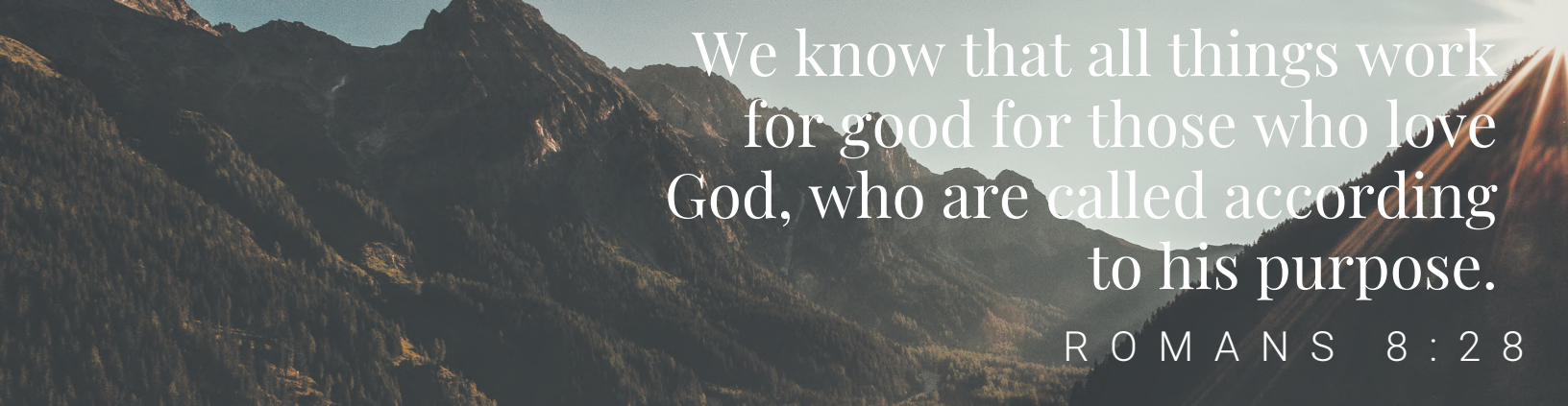

Pete was born to Irish immigrants and raised in West Orange. He graduated from Seton Hall Prep and Seton Hall University, and worked for many years in the Division of Disability Determination Services at the New Jersey Department of Labor until his retirement in 2002. Pete was an active parishioner at St.

Antoninus parish in Newark, NJ and later at Our Lady of the Mount parish in Warren, NJ. He also volunteered as a Boy Scout leader and served as Scoutmaster for Troop 3 in New Jersey for several years.

Pete began to attend prayer meetings of the Catholic charismatic renewal in the late 1970s. On the return flight from a conference in Kansas City he got to know Edwarda Quinn, and on All Saints Day 1980 they were married. "See what love the Father has lavished upon us" (1 John 3), a reading that day, was a fitting description for their married life for the next forty years.

The People of Hope was a very important part of Peter's (and his family's) life, a source of support, a place for deep friendships lasting many years, and most importantly an aid to following the Lord Jesus. After his retirement he volunteered for some years in the community office, and he richly enjoyed this time working with brothers and sisters in the Lord. We, the family, are grateful for the love and prayer you in the community showed Peter during his life, and for your faithfulness to the common life he shared in in the People of Hope. He loved you all very much.

After joining his own to Our Lord's sufferings during Lent and Holy Week, Peter went home to the Lord to whom he had devoted his life with trust just in time to celebrate the Feast of the Resurrection in heaven.
